29/8(b): The process has been initiated for opening of two separate Bank Accounts with Bank of Baroda in the name of 'SRHU USACS- BTS (ZBSA)' and 'SRHU USACS - BTS (Holding Account)', as per the recent directions received from USACS, for the purpose of receiving the funds from NACO/ USACS.

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Item 30/3: To discuss and approve establishment of 'Atal Community Innovation Centre (ACIC)' and to allocate required Space, Infrastructure and Manpower in compliances of the 'Guidelines for setting up of ACIC under Atal Innovation Mission (AIM), NITI Aayog', Government of India.

(Note: The University had applied to Atal Innovation Mission, NITI Aayog, Government of India for grant in aid support under ACIC program for setting up of 'Atal Community Innovation Centre (ACIC)' within the campus. The University was short listed by Atal Innovation Mission and was invited to give a presentation in person before the Screening cum Selection Committee, Atal Innovation Mission, NITI Aayog, New Delhi. Based on the evaluation of the Screening cum Selection Committee, the University has been selected under the scheme and a grant in aid support shall be provided subject to fulfilment of compliance of ACIC guidelines and also on-site verification of the applicant credentials.

As a part of the compliance of ACIC guidelines, approval of the Board is needed for establishment of Atal Community Innovation Centre along with allocation of the required space, infrastructure and manpower.)

The Board deliberated at length. After deliberations, as proposed by Prof. Shivaram Malavalli and seconded by Dr. Shashi Bala Singh, the Board resolved establishing of Atal Community Innovation Centre (ACIC) within the University campus. The Board further resolved that for establishing Atal Community Innovation Centre (ACIC), a fully furnished usable carpet area of minimum 4000 sq.ft. along with required infrastructure, on the third floor of the existing Skill Centre Building shall be allocated for exclusive use by ACIC and the required manpower as per the guidelines for setting up of Atal Community Innovation Centre under Atal Innovation Mission, NITI Aayog, Govt. of India shall also be provided.

(Note: In compliance of the guidelines of ACIC, the University is required to sign Memorandum of Agreement (MoA) with Atal Innovation Mission, NITI Aayog, Govt. of India for establishment of Atal Community Innovation Centre. The Agreement to be entered will be between the Swami Rama Himalayan University together with the Special Purpose Vehicle (SPV) created for purpose of establishing of ACIC as 'First Party' and NITI Aayog as 'Second Party'. The MoA broadly defines background & purpose of First Parties and Second Party, purpose of Grant in Aid, areas of collaboration, duration of the MoA, terms, responsibilities of the promoter/host Institution i.e. SRHU, responsibilities of the SPV, utilization of Grant in Aid, maintenance of financial statements, termination, dispute settlement etc. The Board may like to discuss and consider signing of MoA with NITI Aayog.)

The Board discussed at length on the subject. After deliberations, as proposed by Dr. Vijendra Devisingh Chauhan and seconded by Dr. Shashi Bala Singh, the Board resolved signing of Memorandum of Agreement (MoA) between the Swami Rama Himalayan University together with Special Purpose Vehicle (SPV) created for the purpose of establishing of ACIC (as First Party) and NITI Aayog, Govt. of India (as Second Party). The Board further resolved that the Registrar of the University shall be the authorized signatory on behalf of the University for signing of MoA.

Accordingly, it is proposed that SPV be created which will be known as 'ACIC SWAMI RAMA HIMALAYAN UNIVERSITY INNOVATION AND INCUBATION CENTRE' having its registered office at 3rd Floor Skill Centre Building, Himalayan Institute Hospital Trust, Swami Ram Nagar, Jolly Grant, Dehradun - 248016, Uttarakhand, India for establishment of 'Atal Community Innovation Centre (ACIC)'. The Board may like to discuss and consider the proposal.)

The Board deliberated at length on the proposal. After deliberations, as proposed by Dr. Vijay Dhasmana and seconded by Lt. Gen. (Retd.) Dr. Sanjeev Chopra, the Board resolved that a Special Purpose Vehicle (SPV), 'ACIC SWAMI RAMA HIMALAYAN UNIVERSITY INNOVATION AND INCUBATION CENTRE' be created and be registered as a not-for-profit company under section 8 of the Companies Act, 2013 having its registered office at 3rd Floor Skill Centre Building, Himalayan Institute Hospital Trust, Swami Ram Nagar, Jolly Grant, Dehradun - 248016, Uttarakhand, India.

(Note: It is a mandatory requirement of NITI Aayog that the promoter / host institution of ACIC executes a Surety Bond in favour of NITI Aayog for receiving grant-in-aid of Rs. 2.5 crores and appropriate utilization of funds by the SPV. The Board may like to discuss and consider.)

After deliberations, as proposed by Dr. Vijay Dhasmana and seconded by Dr. Hem Kumar Pande, the Board resolved that being a mandatory requirement, a Surety Bond in favour of NITI Aayog for Grant in Aid of Rs. 2.5 crores be executed by the Swami Rama Himalayan University as surety for SPV named 'ACIC SWAMI RAMA HIMALAYAN UNIVERSITY INNOVATION AND INCUBATION CENTRE'. The Board further resolved that the Registrar of the University shall be the authorized signatory on behalf of the University for signing of Surety Bond.

The Board deliberated at length on the subject. After deliberations, as proposed by Dr. Vijendra Devisingh Chauhan and seconded by Dr. Sunil Kumar Saini, the Board resolved that the objectives and functional outcomes of 'ACIC SWAMI RAMA HIMALAYAN UNIVERSITY INNOVATION AND INCUBATION CENTRE' shall be as under:

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A) Objectives:

The Objective of the 'ACIC SWAMI RAMA HIMALAYAN UNIVERSITY INNOVATION AND INCUBATION CENTRE' is to offer unique and incentivized solutions, which will encourage students, researchers or any individual/group of individuals to ideate and design novel innovative solutions for the communities in and around the Centre. This will be ensured by:

- Nurturing innovators to ideate in areas of societal importance.
- Design thinking process to spur creativity.
- Enabling innovative solutions through Community Tinkering lab facilities in the Community Innovation Centre through Community oriented approach.
- Capacity building of emerging innovators in evolving technologies and designing their innovations from ideation to impactful solutions.
- Collaborating with local industries / institutions in problem solving through innovative offerings in terms of products, services and processes and identifying innovation challenges.
- Developing Public Private Partnership (PPP) and encourage participation of central agencies, PSUs and other legal entities for financial sustainability.
- Supporting and carrying out any other activity relevant to the promotion and incubation of innovators and entrepreneurs.

B) Expected Functional outcomes:

- Sustainable incubation centre within five years of operation.
- Creating a sustainable, scalable & profitable business model in unserved and underserved regions for the potential startups.
- Development of a successful partnership model with academia, Industry, funding resources and existing incubators including Atal Incubation Centre for the startups to leverage.
- Creation of a strong networks of mentors and community development experts for guiding the potential incubates.
- Provide physical infrastructure and value-added support services to Startups / Innovators supporting them in their sustainability.
- Partnering with Atal Tinkering Labs in their respective regions and provide infrastructural and other supports to school students.
- Access to skill development, prototyping facilities, test beds through the integrated Community Tinkering Labs in the Atal Community Innovation Centre.
- Access to customers, markets, and pilot implementation for the ACIC developed innovative product/services.
- A strong team with adequate knowledge and experience in guiding start-ups, building business plans, facilitating investments etc.

The Board further resolved to approve the budget spread over five years for 'ACIC SWAMI RAMA HIMALAYAN UNIVERSITY INNOVATION AND INCUBATION CENTRE' which is annexed as Annexure - 1.

Item 30/11: To discuss and approve establishment of 'Himalayan College of Ayurveda', a new constituent unit of Swami Rama Himalayan University.

(Note: With a spirit of 'One India-One Health', Govt. of India have adopted a holistic approach in our healthcare ecosystem by focusing not only on health but equally on wellness. Along with the modernisation of treatment facilities, efforts have been made to improve nutrition and a clean lifestyle of people.

In holistic treatment approaches, the various traditional complementary and alternative medicine like Acupuncture, Ayurveda, Homeopathy, Naturopathy, Unani, Siddha, Chinese or Oriental medicine etc. may be used together with conventional medicine.

Government of India is expected to soon come out with a policy recommendations on integrative medicine, aiming to bring best practices of modern medicine and AYUSH (Ayurveda, Yoga & Naturopathy, Unani, Siddha and Homoeopathy) systems of medicine. The integrative health policy aims to provide comprehensive healthcare to an individual and the community.

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In view of the above, for the benefit of the people at large, it is proposed to establish the "Himalayan College of Ayurveda" as a new constituent academic unit of Swami Rama Himalayan University. The Board may like to consider the same.)

The Board deliberated at length on the subject. After deliberations, as proposed by Dr. Vijay Dhasmana and seconded by Prof. Shivaram Mallavalli, the Board unanimously resolved to establish 'Himalayan College of Ayurveda', a new constituent academic unit of Swami Rama Himalayan University. The Board further resolved that approval of the Statutory Authority be obtained for commencement of programmes under the 'Himalayan College of Ayurveda'.

Vice Chancellor to take action

Item 30/12: To discuss and approve establishment of 'Himalayan College of Pharmacy', a new constituent unit of Swami Rama Himalayan University.

(Note: The Board of Governors of the University in its 17th Meeting under Agenda Item 17/4 had identified few key areas for the future development plan of the University. One of the key area identified was commencement of Pharmacy programmes.

As the University has adequate infrastructure and facilities to offer the programmes in Pharmacy stream, it is proposed to establish a new constituent academic unit 'Himalayan College of Pharmacy' to conduct the programmes related to Pharmacy. The Board may like to discuss and consider.)

The Board deliberated at length on the subject. After deliberations, as proposed by Dr. Sunil Kumar Saini and seconded by Dr. Vijendra Devisingh Chauhan, the Board unanimously resolved to establish 'Himalayan College of Pharmacy', a new constituent academic unit of Swami Rama Himalayan University. The Board further resolved that approval of the Statutory Council be obtained for commencement of programmes under the 'Himalayan College of Pharmacy'.

Vice Chancellor to take action

Item 30/13: To discuss and approve establishment of a Centre with the name of 'Institute of Integrated Mountain Development-Uttarakhand'.

(Note: The Uttarakhand state was formed with a vision to transform it into a prosperous state and to give voice to the aspirations of the people in the hills. Though, about 85% of the total geographical area of the state is mountainous, only about 49% of the population live in that area while rest live in the plains. An analysis of the per capita income reflects a considerable disparity in the socio-economic status of the people living in the areas under reference, which is one of the concern to be considered. Outmigration from rural areas of the hill districts to urban areas within as well as outside the state is another major concern. Also, there is a need for prosperous and well-developed border areas which are complementary to the security of the country. However, there are plenty of opportunities in the state for horticulture, floriculture and agriculture, tourism adventure, leisure, and eco-tourism, small scale Industries etc.

As there are mountain-specific challenges and state specific-issues like economy and resource base, hill development, regional human geography, inequalities of various kinds, area-specific development perspectives, eco-tourism and development,

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handicrafts, small scale industries, horticulture, agriculture, cooperatives for sustainable development of state, there is a need to document the rich biodiversity & abundant cultural heritage of the Himalayan region and hidden treasures of the state.

In view of the above, a need is felt to establish a resource & knowledge centre within the state for State Specific issues and to contribute towards sustainable livelihood opportunities in Uttarakhand. It will create a knowledge base that can be accessed by policymakers, researchers, businesses, NGOs to provide Science & Technology based solutions to common problems for the socio-economic development of Uttarakhand.

As an initiative to provide the solution for common problems as mentioned above, it is proposed to establish a center with the name "Institute of Integrated Mountain Development, Uttarakhand" in the University. The Board may like to consider the same.)

The Board deliberated at length on the subject. After deliberations, as proposed by Shri Hem Kumar Pande and seconded by Prof. Shivaram Mallavalli, the Board unanimously resolved to establish a Centre with the name of 'Institute of Integrated Mountain Development-Uttarakhand' in University. The Board further resolved that the objectives & functions of the 'Institute of Integrated Mountain Development-Uttarakhand' shall be as follows:

- 1. To identify mountain-specific challenges for sustainable development of the hill districts of the state.
- 2. To evolve a science and technology-based vision for the development of the mountain areas of the state that would help in promoting the welfare and prosperity of the mountain population.
- 3. To submit recommendations for socio-economic upliftment of the people living in the hill districts, particularly those sections of the population which are not adequately benefitting from economic progress.
- 4. To recommend specific initiatives in sectors that would help in the multi-sectoral development of hill areas.
- 5. To act as a science and technology-based knowledge hub for focused socioeconomic development of the hill districts of the state.

Vice Chancellor to take action

Item 30/14: To discuss and approve opening of separate Bank Accounts with Bank of Baroda for the Integrated Counselling and Testing Centre (ICTC) programme sponsored by Uttrarkhand State AIDS Control Society (USACS) as per the guidelines of Central Government.

(Note: Being the member of National AIDS Control Organization (NACO), the University receives, from time-to-time, grant from Uttarakhand State AIDS Control Society (USACS) for executing various activities related to AIDS Control. Earlier the grants were being received in the main account of the University. But as per the recent directions received from USACS, the University now needs to open two separate Bank Accounts (Zero Balance Subsidiary Account and Holding Account) with the Bank of Baroda for the 'Integrated Counselling and Testing Centre (ICTC)' programme. In accordance with Section 21 (2)(g) of Swami Rama Himalayan University Act, the Board of Governors has the power to open, operate and manage the accounts of the University. The Board may like to consider.)

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The Board Discussed and resolved that two separate Bank Accounts in the name of 'SRHU USACS - ICTC (ZBSA)' and 'SRHU USACS - ICTC (Holding Account)' be opened with Bank of Baroda for the purpose of receiving the funds from NACO/USACS.

The Board further resolved that authorized signatories to operate the said Bank Accounts shall be Dr. Vijay Dhasmana, Dr. Prakash Keshaviah, Dr. Vijendra Devisingh Chauhan and Dr. Sunil Kumar Saini. Out of these four authorized signatories, joint signatures of two signatories shall be a 'must' out of which, signatures of Dr. Vijay Dhasmana shall be mandatory for operating the said Bank Accounts.

Vice Chancellor to take action

Item 30/15: To discuss and approve Strategic Plan for 2023-2027 of the University for its the growth and development as recommended by the Board of Management.

Vice Chancellor apprised the Board that the f Strategic Plan of the University for 2023-2027 has been formulated after comprehensive discussions with the faculty, staff, and other stakeholders on various aspects, viz; relevant emerging areas in higher education, curriculum, teaching-learning process, holistic and professionally integrated education, inculcation of skills, attitudes and values, research and development, modernization & capacity building, financial & environmental sustenance, health care & community service, and other spheres in the University system. The formulated Strategic Plan 2023-2027 as recommended by Board of Management is being placed before the Board for discussion and consideration.)

The Board deliberated on layout of strategic plan in depth and laid out 13 strategic goals to be achieved by end of next 5 years. After deliberation the Board approved the Strategic Plan for 2023-2027 which is annexed at **Annexure** -3 of these minutes.

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The Board decided to constitute a monitoring committee at each constituent academic unit, as well as the central level with the objective that the committee of academic unit shall review the progress of the plan on a half-yearly basis while the central monitoring committee will carry out its review once in a year.

Vice Chancellor to take action

Item 30/16: Any other point with the permission of the Chair.

- a) All the members unanimously appreciated the efforts of the University and congratulated Dr. Vijay Dhasmana and his team for establishing the Atal Community Innovation Centre and adding three more academic institutions in the University.
- b) Lt. Gen. (Retd.) Dr. Sanjeev Chopra suggested that due caution be exercised for utilization of grant-in-aid ensuring strict compliance with the capping limits under each head of expenditure, as prescribed by NITI Aayog.
- c) Prof. Shivaram Mallavalli expressed his pleasure regarding the establishment of the Institute of Integrated Mountain Development-Uttarakhand as one of the dreams of H.H. Dr. Swami Rama, the founder, being fulfilled.
