### Report of the World Intellectual Property (IP) Day celebrated on 26<sup>th</sup> April, 2025

**RJ Kaavya and Himanshu Darmora (Vocalist)** visited Swami Rama Himalayan University on the 26<sup>th</sup> April, 2025 with a purpose of celebration of World IP Day where a panel discussion was held on the theme “Music and IP: Feel the beat of IP”.

The primary objective of the panel discussion would focus on educating creators and entrepreneurs about the significance of IP rights in protecting their musical innovations as also freely expanding their reach in the global market without infringement. Dr. Rajendra Dobhal, Vice Chancellor, SRHU emphasized on the importance of IP protection for musicians, especially in the context of both traditional forms like gharana music and the modern digital music landscape.



The panel highlighted the rich legacy of gharana music, emphasizing its historical and cultural importance in India's musical tradition. The discussion touched on the need to preserve and protect the unique styles of different gharanas under IP laws, ensuring that artists' rights are respected and that their cultural contributions are safeguarded from unauthorized use. The rapid rise of digital platforms has transformed the music industry, enabling global access to music. However, it also raises concerns about piracy and unauthorized reproductions. RJ Kaavya shared insights on how digitization has both

benefited and challenged musicians, offering greater exposure but also opening the door for potential IP violations. Himanshu Darmora discussed the importance of leveraging digital tools to protect music rights, such as using blockchain and other technologies to track the origin and ownership of digital content. The panel also focused on the growing issue of copyright infringement in the music industry. With the ease of sharing music online, unauthorized use of songs and compositions has become a major problem. Experts discussed the role of IP laws in enforcing copyright protection, educating artists and consumers about respecting musical works, and encouraging stronger legal measures to combat piracy.

### Report of the International Day of Women and Girls in Science celebrated on 11<sup>th</sup> February, 2025

**Dr Sadhana Srivastava**, Former Head, IPR, Innovation and Translation Research (ITR) Division, Indian Council of Medical Research, New Delhi visited Swami Rama Himalayan University on the 11th February, 2025 with a purpose of guiding Researchers, Scientists, Faculty and students on technology commercialization and scientific research



Sadhana Srivastava began her speech by emphasizing the growing need for gender inclusivity in science, particularly in the areas of research and technology transfer. She pointed out that women scientists, researchers, and technologists are contributing immensely to innovations across various fields, from biotechnology and pharmaceuticals to artificial intelligence and environmental sciences. Srivastava stressed the importance of recognizing these contributions and creating environments where women can thrive in these critical fields.

A significant portion of Srivastava's address focused on the field of **technology transfer**—a crucial mechanism for translating scientific innovations into real-world applications. She underscored how intellectual property rights (IPR) and technology commercialization play a key role in transforming scientific discoveries into products that can benefit society at large. Srivastava highlighted the increasing role of women in technology transfer at institutions like ICMR, where many of the country's health innovations are developed and protected.

The event concluded with a powerful call to action: to work together in closing the gender gap in science and technology and to create a world where women and girls can freely pursue their passions in research and innovation. Sadhana Srivastava's speech was a timely reminder of the importance of breaking down barriers, fostering equality, and amplifying the voices of women in shaping the future of science.

The International Day of Women and Girls in Science 2025, with its focus on women in research, technology transfer, and intellectual property rights, marked another important step in the global movement for gender equality in science.
